2. Grammar: CAN/CAN'T

Can is a modal verb. The negative form of can is cannot, but we usually use the short form can't. We use can and can't to talk about ability. We use can to talk about things we are able to do and can't about things we are not able to do.

We use modal verbs before other verbs:

THOUGH VEIDS R	ciore other verbs.	
I		
You		sing
He	can	swim
She	can't (cannot)	play the piano
It		speak English
We		dance
You		write computer
They		programs

Modal verbs do not change their form after he, she or it.

I can dance but I can't sing. He can play the piano. She can't swim.

We use **can+you+infinitive** to make requests – when we want someone else to do something:

Can you take a message?
