What were the changes that took place in your workplace for the past five years?

Were these changes beneficial?

YUKO SOMA: The work we do every day is changing. Just ten years ago few of us used computers on a daily basis. Now a computer is as essential as a pencil. How will our jobs be ten years from now? Will we work at home? Will machines do most of the work? Will we have more free time? And will we be better paid? I talked to some prominent Asian executives to get their opinions. Here's Charles Tang of Zenith Architects.

CHARLES TANG: My staff share ideas best when they are comfortable – we often sit around with coffee and share ideas. So I think more and more companies will provide space for workers to relax and share ideas: rooms with comfortable seating, free snacks and drinks, you know. Uh, kinda like a family sitting around the kitchen table.

YUKO SOMA: Doesn't sound like my office! Here's what Choi Sun Jin of Walker Publishing has to say.

CHOI SUN JIN: In the future we will have to be ready to work anywhere, anytime. At home, in the car, in a hotel – wherever we may be – the traditional office won't exist. When companies need to hold face-to-face meetings there will be office space they can rent – just like a hotel.

Otherwise we will meet with colleagues and clients in virtual space.

YUKO SOMA: Now here's what Satoshi Miura of Taylor and Saunders, a major US accounting firm, thinks.

Twenty years from now, holding long-distance meetings in front of life-size screens will be routine. But first we must find more efficient ways to share information. Now, if you write an email and send it to twenty people you might get fifteen different or even contradictory replies. So you have to send fifteen or more different replies. This is not an efficient way to share information. The virtual office of the future will give all team members a single focus for comments or replies. Any work conversation will be recorded, so rather than having to open months' worth of e-mails, all relevant information will be in one place.

YUKO SOMA: So, there you have it. Telecommuting, virtual conferencing, office hotels ... personally I like the idea of a more comfortable office. I'm Yuko Soma.

Work in the future
